ven the closure of Admirals Road Bridge at the end of June did not seem to deter many from this wonderful event. Our success is surely a combination good weather, world class venue, great financial support, and the fantastic volunteers who continue to step up each year.

Music in the Park events in Meadow and Rudd Parks were also very well attended, showing healthy growth from last year. We are looking forward to more of this kind of community music next year.


That was the fun part. From attending various committee meetings and park cleanups, to considering urban forest strategies, traffic issues, neighbourhood art, and backyard hens, to tackling the problem of over-flowing waste receptacles in our parks, the GTCA Directors were kept busy well into the fall. Looking ahead, we are planning to hold a one day board retreat in early 2010 to review our strategic direc-

Outside of our neighbourhood, we were asked to provide comments for the community action plans around the Shelbourne Street corridor and the North Douglas Street corridor (now called the Uptown Saanich Action Plan). The GTCA supports both of these projects, but has suggested that each project begin with a charrette process (similar to the 2004 Tillicum Burnside Action Plan that was so successful in our neighbourhood), as this process allows for a truly inclusive community vision. We also commented on the CRD mixed-use proposal for the old Mount View High School site on Carey Road. While this development, which includes care for seniors and affordable housing, is urgently needed in Saanich, we agreed with the Mount View Community Association that their neighbourhood needs a better balance of recreational green space and development.

On a final note, we have always encouraged board directors to participate in learning opportunities as they relate to our community. To that end, your vice-president, Harry Lewis, and I attended the Gaining Ground Summit in Vancouver in October (www.gaininggroundsummit.com).

An Admirals/McKenzie Bus Route?

If you travel by car, you may have noticed that the corridor along Admirals/McKenzie is a commonly travelled route from our neighbourhood. If you use transit, you will know that there is no route by bus to take us from our neighbourhood to Esquimalt along Admirals Rd., nor out the other direction along McKenzie. It's nearly impossible to get to the Glanford area without taking multiple busses, which adds significant travel time. Or how about getting to the sports facilities at Bullen Park/Esquimalt Rec Centre?

Wouldn't it be great to have a direct route to UVic? Past inquiries to BC Transit about a possible route down Admirals/McKenzie were not even considered due to the old bridge. However, now that we have a very sturdy new bridge, we may have an opportunity to have this value-added service. Art in Gorge Waterway Park


e have an exciting bit of artistic news for the community. When Saanich developed the new section of Gorge Waterway Park in 2004, money was set aside to be dedicated to public art in accordance with Saanich's Comprehensive Art Policy. This art, a sculpture, is finally going to be created and enjoyed by visitors to the park. In the spring of 2009, Saanich organized and held an Art Jury process to choose a work of art. A call to artists went out through local papers and media sources, and 18 artists came forward with their proposals. The jury selected 3 finalists based on criteria outlined in the art policy. In early October, a winner was chosen! Fred Dobbs, local to the Gorge Tillicum community, is a well known world champion sand-sculptor who has sculpted local architectural pieces along with many notable sculptures throughout the capital. Look for his sculpture, to be located between the water and the red brick house, sometime in the spring of 2010!

West Gorge Transportation Committee Update

With the completion of the Admirals Bridge, Saanich Engineering and the West Gorge Transportation Committee (WGTC) met in October to discuss the Neighbourhood Transportation Management Plan (NTMP) for the West Gorge Area.

raffic counts will be carried out this fall on all streets originally counted in 2004 to determine changes to the traffic pattern with the closure of Colquitz at Admirals Road. After completing a comparison analysis of the counts, Saanich engineers will meet with the WGTC to prioritize the remaining elements of the NTMP.



Two items of the plan were completed in the spring of 2008, the concrete sidewalk on Bodega and the pedestrian refuge on the Davida hill. These two projects alone have cost 60% of our allotted budget of \$160,000, approved in 2006. However, we have been assured by Saanich Engineering that they are committed to the entire process and will apply for funding each year until the NTMP is complete.

The Engineering Department has requested funding in the 2010 budget to complete 4 items of the NTMP:

- 1. Cowper/Colquitz intersection design,
- 2. Cowper/Austin intersection redesign,
- 3. Arena Road/Bodega median,

4. Austin/Newberry/Ker sidewalk with an unsignalled crosswalk near Ker and Dysart at the entrance to Cuthbert Holmes Park,

The redesign of the two intersections is a priority for Saanich. Cowper, a collector road, will likely see more traffic with Colquitz/Admirals closed and the design, consisting of a centre median, along with other features, is intended to increase safety and reduce speed.

The installation of a median on Arena Road approaching Bodega will curtail the continued shortcutting up Bodega. The Austin/Newberry/Ker sidewalk will start at the north end of Austin, run along the north side of Ker, and is intended for pedestrians to safely access both parks.

Saanich Engineering plans to make budget requests in 2011 that will undertake the remaining elements of the NTMP, which focus on the reduction of speed along our roads. Reduction of speed has consistently been identified at public meetings and on surveys as the number one concern of West Gorge residents.

At our meeting, we were also informed by Saanich Engineering of the plan to have a sidewalk built along one side of Dysart Road as a Greenway connecting Cuthbert Holmes Park and the Gorge Waterway. This is referenced in the Local Area Plan (2000) for the Tillicum Area. (See www.saanich.ca, under Business and Development follow the links under Community Plan to the Local Area Plan.)

Saanich Engineers also reminded us about the Boulevard Planting Policy. Planting on the boulevard can be used to improve aesthetics and would also act as a traffic calming measure. Residents can apply to Saanich for a boulevard permit to plant ground cover, shrubs, perennials, and even trees! A list preferred plantings and related policies are on the Saanich website (again under Business and Development, follow links to Development, then Permits).



During the building boom that preceded the First War, numerous houses were erected locally by professional builders, either for profit or their own family use. Two adjacent houses built in 1913 by Arthur Bird across from Tillicum School fit these two categories.

orn in 1865, this Englishman was lured west by the Klondike gold rush of 1898. Briefly escaping the waning gold fever, Bird spent some time in Victoria building a house (seen here soon after construction) for wife Louisa and their young family at 3108 Albina Street. Soon afterwards, a second house (also still extant) was built next door to provide the family with rental income. This was a good thing because Bird then spent much of the next twenty years in the North West Territories trapping for furs and seeking an elusive wealth underground. Only a seam of coal came his way. At age sixty-nine, Arthur Bird was last seen in the summer of 1934 when he set out to explore the terrain around Great Bear Lake. Though his remains were never found, a diary retrieved from an abandoned cabin spoke of his last days: "1, January, 1935. Everything looks black. No fur, no money, near 70 and 120 miles back. Don't think I can make it."

Though Bird only spent winters at his Albina Street home, other members of the family resided there for over eighty years.

In 1916, daughter Gracie attended the one-room Tillicum schoolhouse then located on Burnside Road. A class-photo displayed in the foyer of the present-day school shows the young girl standing front-and-centre, her head tilted to one side. One of her many recollections in later years dated back to the First War: "I remember an army troop marching along Burnside Road and a whole bunch of us kids from Tillicum School followed them to town. A lot of us had never been that far and when we got there we were flabbergasted by the stores."
